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Playwright Bios

Agyeiwaa Asante is an Ghanaian- American theatre artist based in Maryland. Her plays include, SWIRL (Kennedy Center's Page-to-Stage Festival 2017, Watermelon One- Act Festival- Best Production 2019), HELP WANTED (Silver Spring One Act Festival, Elemental Women Productions) and DAINTY (BOLD NYC's 2020 Festival).
